On behalf of the board of directors and staff of Kiwassa Neighbourhood House we are very pleased to present our annual report for 2022-2023. We want to express our deep gratitude to all of our exceptional staff and dedicated volunteers who bring their whole selves every day and make the work that happens at Kiwassa possible.

This last year was one of change and transformation for our organization and our community. Perhaps the most transformative and notable development was the vote organized by our staff to unionize – expanding the BCGEU bargaining unit from one program to all but four. Although this has required some complex and evolving changes to our policies and processes, it also brings with it valuable structures that support our values and principles regarding collaboration, inclusion, and grassroots decision-making. We are grateful to all of our staff who are helping to ensure that the voices and priorities of workers are being heard within the organization.

Another significant development was the departure of our Executive Director, Devika Ramkhelawan, in March 2023. Devika stepped away for a new opportunity after helping to guide the organization through COVID 19, expanded unionization, and many more changes and developments. We are so grateful for Devika's excellent work, particularly with regards to initiatives related to inclusion, anti-racism, and Truth and Reconciliation. The Kiwassa Board of Directors is planning to announce a new Executive Director in the Fall/Winter of 2023.

Message from the Board President and Executive Director

As we make our way through these organizational changes, Kiwassa's commitment to community and place-based programs remain strong and at the core of everything that we do. With the continued lifting of COVID 19 restrictions, many of our programs made the transition from hybrid participation to full in-person participation. From Family Drop-ins to Out of School Care to Seniors programming to Community Lunches, we have seen a significant increase in connections and engagement at the House this year. We are looking forward to continuing to support these relationships, as well as building new ones as we collaborate with our community on new programs and partnerships such as our Community Development initiatives at Chimo and Grandview Terraces, supported by BC Housing.

Change is an important and natural part of growth and, although challenging at times, it is what enables Kiwassa to adapt and respond to the evolving needs of our members and community. We appreciate the support of our community, staff, and partners through these changes so that we can better achieve our mission of building a more socially just, resilient, and connected neighbourhood. Looking to the future, we are excited by the opportunities that these changes bring with them and the ability to continue to do this important work in relationship with you.

Connected

Together Kiwassa's staff, volunteers, partners, and neighbours create and nurture opportunities for people to find connection across generations, cultures and identities.

Monthly community lunches resumed in May 2022 after a two-year hiatus due to COVID 19. Hosted by Food Program and Seniors Program, and with support from Community Engagement Program and volunteers, these meals on the 1st and 3rd Friday of every month routinely bring together over 50 people from the neighbourhood who come to connect over food. Lunch is open to all community members and the meals are healthy and reflect the rich cultural diversity in our neighbourhood.

This year Kiwassa also expanded a partnership with BC Housing to directly support seniors, families, and children living in 149 low-income units at Grandview Terrace. A community developer through Kiwassa works on site to strengthen place-based support and community connections, and to cultivate tenant wellbeing and belonging. Throughout the year, tenants were supported with over 365 meals and snacks, neighbourhood out trips including bowling, senior centres, and cafés, and special events to recognize personal and cultural milestones.

Connected

In addition to after-school drop-in and summer camp, this year Youth Program focused on connecting participants to community resources, helping to build their sense of ownership and belonging in the neighbourhood, and tap into resources to support their well-being. Every Wednesday the youth were supported to attend an art program at the Vancouver Public Library Hastings Branch, to foster creative expression while building healthy peer to peer and peer to adult relationships. Youth were also connected to Union Gospel Mission Thrift Store and given the opportunity to shop for free, creating a dignified experience for young people to pick out seasonal clothes to support personal style, job interviews and employment, and special occasions.

Family Place Drop In resumed daily in-person service this year, offering free activities, meals, and opportunities for connections between children and caregivers. Through yoga, story time, crafts, and workshops supported by staff and community partners, drop-in brings multi-cultural and multi-generational families together to form healthy relationships and create a sense of belonging.

Secure

Kiwassa's consistent and reliable people and programs contribute to a place where neighbours feel safe and included and have the security to pursue their own connections and contributions to our community.

In January 2023, Kiwassa's Harbourview and Variety Club Childcare Centres became S10aDay sites, and local MLA Niki Sharma was on site to help make the announcement and celebrate alongside families, staff and children. The expansion of affordable daycare helps ease the burden on families, creates security, and increases feelings of livability and sustainability in our neighbourhood.

This year Kiwassa also launched a partnership with Men Transforming Our Relationships (MenTOR), a program designed for men who may be stuck in a cycle of tension and high conflict in their family systems, and are ready to learn tools for healthier and more secure relationships. Kiwassa hosted two cohorts on site, each running weekly for 18 weeks, to foster a safe, blame-free, and transformative space to help participants recognize that they have the power to actively choose to think, speak, and act differently. Through a blend of conversation, teaching and exercises, men engaged in personal growth individually and in relationship to one another, and explore new healthy practices of relating safely and lovingly in their homes and with their families.

Additionally, we saw incredible personal growth and development in the 50 racialized newcomer women who graduated from our Pathways to Leadership program throughout the year. Through leadership workshops specifically designed for newcomers, supported by interpreters in Farsi, Spanish, and Cantonese, participants grew their confidence to contribute to their new communities, and developed 12 distinct civic engagement projects.

Socially Just

While everyone is welcome at Kiwassa, we work to create more opportunities for the many people in our neighbourhood dealing with multiple forces of oppression.

A new program called Reaching Home, an initiative by the Government of Canada's National Housing Strategy, allowed Kiwassa's Settlement Program to partner with Lu'ma Native BC Housing Society and Vancity Community Foundation to deliver community-based support for preventing and reducing homelessness. New funding to grow the settlement team resulted in increased staff capacity for homelessness prevention, and families received groceries, essential need items, assistance in applying for social supports and welfare, and other supports to reduce the many challenges and barriers in the resettlement process.

In a new partnership between Kiwassa's Children's Program and KidSafe, free, place-based Spring Break Camp returned to the neighbourhood house for the first time since 2019. The camp included daily breakfast, lunch, snacks, out trips, educational components, and a large staff team from both organizations to help foster healthy relationships. All camp participants were referred by school support workers to ensure an equitable approach to access to this low-barrier service.

The Hastings Sunrise Neighbourhood Food Network, led by Kiwassa, became a United Way Food Hub, enhancing our food security work and supporting collective community projects. With food insecurity rising, dignified food access is at the centre of Kiwassa's work, and the Food Program's community markets and weekly low-cost produce markets connect our neighbours to low-barrier and low-cost local organic vegetables. This year the Market Greens Rx Program funding was extended for two years, providing \$20,000 in free produce over two years for 39 families.

Resilient

Our work is adaptive, responsive, and community-led, helping to nurture a resilient neighbourhood where residents and staff have the support they need to face challenges and cultivate their own strengths.

Through four cohorts of the EMPOW3R Employment Readiness Training for Survivors Program, Kiwassa supported 50 women experiencing barriers to employment, complete training to become Early Childhood Education Assistants (ECE-A). Through partnership with Burnaby Community and Continuing Education, EMPOW3R grads obtained excellent marks with a 100% course completion rate and 80% of participants are now employed in positions. The program creates opportunity to pursue meaningful employment as well as helping to address the critical shortage of childcare support in our province, and even after graduation participants continue to receive guidance from employment staff and our resident trauma counsellor.



Resilient

In childcare, after two years of cancelled events due to COVID-19, thanks to easing restrictions families were finally able to gather and celebrate with a carnival at the PNE. Over 450 new and returning families, and those who had graduated out in covid years, gathered for shared food, rides and entertainment by local artists and childcare parents, and the opportunity to move from family isolation to social connection.

Organizational capacity building and an emphasis on learning together with our community continued to grow this year at Kiwassa. We continue to support staff wellbeing and sustainability and to help nurture and develop skills and competencies. Staff attended workshops on queer competency, intersectionality, supporting neurodiverse children, and mental health first aid. In Out of School Care our Aboriginal Supported Child Development Enhancement Worker offered us an exciting and rich learning opportunity with their Knowledge Keeper, Sally Lee. Sally shared cultural teachings including the Seven Sacred Teachings, Medicine Wheel Teachings, creating Dream Catchers with the children, and shared beautiful singing and drumming.


Kiwassa housing includes 56 permanent family housing units in two buildings, May MacLean Place and Norah Davis Gardens; 44 of those units are subsidized housing for low income families.

Our housing and facilities staff are committed to building relationships with staff, understanding and responding to need, creating opportunities for tenants to connect socially and increase feelings of security, ownership, and pride in the places they live.
